 <b>Nishan Sahib</b>	 <b>Head Covering</b>	This is the flag that shows that the Gurdwara is a place of worship.
 <b>Darbar Sahib</b>	 <b>Manji Sahib</b>	The Hall that contains the Takht where the Guru Grandth Sahib is placed during the day.
 <b>Four Doors</b>	 <b>Golak</b>	These show that all are welcome there are 4 to represent North, East, South and West.
 <b>Chanani</b>	 <b>Chaur</b>	The canopy is made of decorative cloth it covers the Guru Granth Sahib from above.
 <b>Shoe Rack</b>	 <b>Rumala</b>	Shoes are placed here.
 <b>Palki Sahib</b>	 <b>Langar</b>	It has 4 posters and contains the Manji Sahib.
		This is a raised platform.
		Where worshippers donate money.
		A fan waved over the Grandth Sahib which is the holy book.
		This is a free communal kitchen. People sit on the floor.
		Hair must be covered before entering the Gurdwara.
		A special cloth placed over the holy book when it is not being read.

## Answers

<p><b>Nishan Sahib</b></p> 	<p>This is a flag that shows the Gurdwara is a place of worship. It has the Sikh symbol called the 'Khanda' on it.</p>
<p><b>Darbar Sahib</b></p> 	<p>This hall contains the Takht where the Guru Granth Sahib is placed during the day. You cannot have your feet facing the holy book or turn your back to it while in this room.</p>
<p><b>Four Doors</b></p> 	<p>These show that all people are welcome. There are four to represent north, east, south and west.</p>
<p><b>Chanani</b></p> 	<p>The canopy is made of decorated cloth. It covers the Guru Granth Sahib from above.</p>
<p><b>Shoe Rack</b></p> 	<p>Shoes are placed here. Wearing shoes in the prayer hall is considered disrespectful.</p>
<p><b>Palki Sahib</b></p> 	<p>It has four posters. It contains the Manji Sahib.</p>
<p><b>Head Covering</b></p> 	<p>Hair must be covered before entering the Darbar Sahib (prayer hall). It is normal to cover one's head with a scarf, turban, patka or bandana.</p>
<p><b>Manji Sahib</b></p> 	<p>This is a raised platform. This is where the Guru Granth Sahib is placed during the day.</p>
<p><b>Golak</b></p> 	<p>This is placed at the front of the Manji Sahib. It is where worshippers donate money to the temple.</p>
<p><b>Chaur</b></p> 	<p>This is a fan waved over the holy book. It is made from yak's hair.</p>
<p><b>Rumala</b></p> 	<p>This is a special cloth placed on the Guru Granth Sahib when it is not being read. It is made of silk and embroidered.</p>
<p><b>Langar</b></p> 	<p>This is a free communal kitchen. Everyone is expected to sit together and eat to show they are all equal.</p>
