Key Stage 4 Music & Arts Trip

On Wednesday 22nd February pupils from across Key Stage 4 went on a school trip to London to enhance their learning in Music and Art.

To start the day all the pupils met in the dining hall before getting on a coach which would take us to London. On the way the pupils were treated to an extended tour of some London sights due to the coach driver taking us to the wrong Art Gallery. This did mean however that pupils were able to see the London Eye, Tower Bridge and the Tower of London.

Eventually we arrived at the Tate Modern and we split into groups to explore the gallery and see some of the amazing artwork on display including works from Roy Lichenstein and Wang Guangyi. Many pupils were intrigued by some of the more conceptual and modern pieces leading to an in depth discussion around "what is Art?".

After we had explored the gallery we gathered in the main lobby and had our lunch where we were treated to some of Mrs Bennett's famous sausage rolls which went down a treat (as they always do).

We made the long walk to the Theatre along the River Thames but thought it would be a good idea to go and see the London Eye up close first.



Computing Update

Software

There has been a conscious decision by the Department to choose software used in lessons, that is free accessible and pupils can practice on at home if they wish. The majority of software used by pupils is now either available online using their schoolcreated accounts (Microsoft Office 365, Adobe Creative Cloud, etc.) or are freely usable/downloadable to devices.

One example of this has been the image editing website Pixlr. Many of the Year 7's have loved using Pixlr to edit and manipulate images so much so that they have been using it at home. The Computing Teachers have been delighted to see their creativity.

Python Programming Club

After Christmas saw the introduction of a weekly lunchtime Python programming club for all interested Year 10 and Year 11 pupils.

Python is a textual programming language that is seen as a good introduction to all programming languages and is taught in Computer Science lessons.

In the coming terms, Year 9 pupils will be invited to attend the club as they learn the basics of the programming language in their lessons. This will be rolled out over the coming year to other Secondary Year groups

STEM Focus Day


Computing was actively involved in the Primary School for the recent STEM Focus Day (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) with all pupils learning how they can program hardware. Using BBC Micro:Bits the pupils undertook several programming tasks including making a name badge with scrolling text.

Due to the excitement shown at these sessions, pupils are going to be included in the programming units in Term 6.

Safer Internet Day

Safer Internet Day occurred on 7th February. Safer Internet Day is an annual event that is celebrated across 170 different countries on a date in February. It is a chance for young people to think about what worries they might have about using technology and the internet and celebrate the fantastic things technology can help us with.

In Key Stage Assemblies this year's theme of "Want to Talk About It?" was presented to the pupils. In Lesson time that week, pupils took part in the Safer Internet Day challenge of creating short films about their online experiences, specifically talking about what they enjoy most about the internet or what they would like to change on the internet if they could. These were shown on the large monitor screens in the corridors around the school.





World Book Day

On the 1st March, Bower Grove celebrated their annual World Book Day. This year, the theme was inspired by Virago Publishers on their 50th anniversary. Virago are pioneers for female authors, illustrators and editors, allowing them a platform to publish their works on a global scale.

Pupils in Badgers, Falcons and Year 7 took part in an interactive workshop by visiting, acclaimed author, Jane Elson, which focused on her best-selling novel, 'How to Fly with Broken Wings'.



In Key Stages 3 and 4, pupils attended lessons inspired by the works of female authors. In PE, pupils participated in Ancient Olympic Games, inspired by Madelline Miller's 'A Song of Achilles'; in English lessons, Years 8, 10 and 11 all completed a mystery Agatha Christie-style Escape Room; and in Food Technology, pupils enjoyed making Mary Berry Viennese Swirls.



There were lots of wonderful outfits by both staff and pupils alike, all of whom got into the spirit of the day. At lunchtime, pupils were treated to a special lunch: spaghetti and meatballs, inspired by a Nigella Lawson recipe, with Gruffalo-themed side dishes, Fox's Fiery Wedges and Owl's Garlic Bread.



Pupils from Foxes, Eagles and the Satellite class spent World Book day at Bedgebury Pinetum. They explored the forest looking for hidden statues of The Gruffalo and friends. Pupils walked over 2 miles on the trail and still had enough energy to play in the park after lunch.

It was a terrific day, full of fun and engaging learning; we cannot wait to celebrate World Book Day again in 2024.







In the week March 20th – 24th we recognised French-speaking countries around the world #Francosphère. There were daily form time activities with interactive games to win house points, the Défi Dégustation (Taste It Thursday) was the Moroccan breakfast dish Loubia and adults had different flavour French crisps (from sheep's cheese and with cherry to honey mustard) to try every day.

On Friday March 24th we celebrated La Journée Internationale de la Francophonie. Each class researched then decorated their door with the flag of a French-speaking country and so the corridors looked really colourful. It was almost impossible to choose winners and in fact there were 3 adults highly commended and 3 other classes.

These were the Top 3! (10D, Frogs, Foxes)

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Special mention should also go to the Primary classes for their excellent dressing in their flag colours – I was very impressed. Mr Starks' outfit in Sénégal's flag colours was particularly striking!

In assembly volunteers tried translating French sentences and an inter-House Kahoot quiz with 50 teams saw Neptune come out victorious but 5 teams scored full points! Just shows how much they had learnt through the week and in the assembly about French-speaking countries! Many thanks to Penguins (Mollie, Kael, Joey & Tommy S), Eagles (Alexis, Alfie J, Finlay, Joel, Mackenzie & Tommy), Falcons (Alex, Jake, Michael, Renae & Miss Nicholls) 7L (Layton & Teddy), 7S (Adam, Henry, Jayden, Thomas & Tony) and 8V (Kayden & Oliver) for presenting in assembly.

In the Primary classes pupils focused on their allocated country for the day and looked at its History and Geography. All lessons across the school had

elements of French-speaking countries linked in from counting in French (Maths) and doing French colour by number (Art) to researching a francophone country and then writing a sketch imagining you were there spending the correct currency and visiting the sight (Drama). From looking at nonfiction texts about homelessness in France or looking at the Count of Monte Cristo text (English) to planning your route across Canada à la BBC's Race Around the World (ICT). From Fair trade ethical



chocolate from French-speaking Africa (Global Learning) to Moroccan breakfast in Food Tech.



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Thank you to the kitchen for introducing elements of #francosphère into the lunch menu with poutine from Canada (cheesy chips), gauffres from Belgium (waffles) and mousse au chocolate from France. It really was a great team effort to make the week work so well and the atmosphere around the school was really upbeat. Thank you to everyone for their support and engagement.

interactive resources in French, Spanish, German, Italian,

Portuguese, Mandarin Chinese, Arabic, Russian, Polish, Welsh, Scottish Gaelic, Maori, and English to match curriculum requirements.

Organised in topic areas, the materials are presented via a host of immersive multimedia activities. The site covers all topics encountered in lessons throughout the year and also includes printable worksheets.

As part of our licence, all our pupils can access the Linguascope website from home. The website can be used independently by pupils to consolidate what they have learned in class, revise for upcoming tests, get a head start learning new vocabulary, or even introduce themselves to a new language.

The interactive activities are also tablet-friendly, with FREE iPad and Android apps that pupils can install on their mobile devices: *https://www.linguascope.com/apps/*

Remember: Learning a language doesn't take years – it takes minutes every day. Practising little and often is key to rapid progress.

Frogs Class

In Frogs Class this term we have been learning all about Castles




We began the term by researching what castles were and whereabouts in the world they can be found in our <u>English</u> lessons. We used our library time to find information books about castles and have had these on display in our classrooms.



In <u>**DT**</u> and <u>**PD**</u> the children worked together as a team to create their very own castles using cardboard, sticky tape and scissors. The adults supported by cutting parts that the children wanted e.g. the doors and the arrow slits. They absolutely loved becoming knights and defending their forts!!



In <u>Science</u> we have been looking at different materials that were used many years ago to build castles. We thought about which materials are still used for buildings today. The children have been using vocabulary such as 'smooth, rough, bumpy, hard, weak and breakable to describe various materials.



In <u>Maths</u> we have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. We have been using language such as; 'curved, straight, edges, sides, flat, solid, corners, vertices and faces' to describe the different shapes. The pupils were then set a task to sort the shapes into 2D and 3D shapes, shapes that roll and do not roll or shapes with curved edges and straight edges. We had lots of discussion around shapes and were able to share this knowledge with our friends.



Frogs Class

In our Art and DT sessions we created our own castles using a cereal box. We opened the 3D shape up so that is was a flat net. We then drew the turrets on the top and drew the arrow slits and windows on. Then we cut the things we had drawn out using scissors. After that, we chose one colour to paint the castle. Once dry we drew the brick work on using a black felt tip pen. We fixed the cereal box back into its original shape; sticking it together with tape. We then stuck the castle onto a plain piece of cardboard. We painted the mote around the base of the castle and then the grass.

What do you think of the finished product?



We used paint rollers to get an even finish on the cardboard.



In our Phonics sessions we have been learning and revising our phonemes. We are becoming more confident to use the graphemes to help us when writing words. We are so pleased with the children's progress. **Well done Frogs!**



Our fine motor skills are really developing. We have been using various writing tools to help improve our writing. We have been learning how to form our numbers correctly. We like to use whiteboard pens to practise with. Look at this marvellous piece of Maths work! Number formation and some calculation work too.




We have begun to look at Animals and their young in Science. We heard some whispers in school that something special was happening by the school pond. We got our magnifying glasses, pens, clipboards and binoculars ready and set off to investigate. Can you guess what we found?? Frogs spawn and a Mummy frog. We took some photos and will be visiting the pond weekly to keep a close eye on the changes we notice. We look forward to seeing the tadpoles appear soon and then watching them grow into their adult form.



Onsite PE

During Term 4, the PE department have been focusing on ball games within primary lessons and secondary lessons such as: Handball, Tag Rugby, Netball, Basketball and Football. The pupils have been focusing on ball skills and progressing into competitive games. When focusing on team games, we like to encourage lots of sportsmanship by asking pupils to shake hands and to take the losses positively.

PE

Offsite PE

In PE we like to have pupils go offsite to experience sport in a different environment. This term, from Key Stage 3, 7L have been swimming at a local leisure centre; 7S have been doing survival games at a nearby woods; and 8F have been to Gymfinity where they have explored their gymnastics. Within Key Stage 4, 10W have been to Cyclopark and 10D have been doing Survival Games. In the Junior school, Falcons have been the class who have been swimming this term.

Next term, the Key Stage 3 class that are offsite are: 8V going to Survival, 9D going to Swimming and 9L going to Cyclopark.

Francophonie Day

To celebrate Francophonie Day within the department, we delivered a lesson with Penguins and Falcons about Parkour which originates from France. We set up all of our gymnastic apparatus to allow pupils to explore.





World Book Day

For World Book Day we celebrated female authors. In the PE department, we based our lesson off of the book 'The Song of Achilles' which is focused on the Greek Olympics, where the Olympic Games originated from. Using this as inspiration, we showed pupils some boxing skills, teaching them stance and combinations on the pads. This is because boxing was one of the original sports within the Olympics in Ancient Greece.





Recipe to Try at Home Chocolate Easter Nests

Ingredients:

- * 4 Shredded Wheat (crushed)
- * 200g Milk Chocolate (broken into pieces)
- * Sweets to decorate (i.e. chocolate eggs)

Equipment Needed:

2 Mixing Bowls, Wooden Spoon, Spatula, 2 Teaspoons, Bun Tin, 12 Cake Cases

Method:

- 1. Put the paper cases into the bun tin.
- 2. Put chocolate into a bowl and melt in the microwave using 10 second bursts until fully melted (stir as you go).
- 3. Put the crushed shredded wheat in a bowl and add the chocolate to it using the spatula to scrap sides of bowl.
- 4. Stir the ingredients together making sure all the shredded wheat is coated in chocolate (stir very quickly as once the chocolate is added to the shredded wheat it will set very quick).
- 5. Share the mixture between the cake cases using two teaspoons, make a small dip in the centre.
- 6. Place the sweets in each 'nest'.

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7. Place into the fridge to chill and set.
