Aspire

This term, pupils in 9D have been developing home maintenance skills, such as mechanics and gardening at the local Bower Grove allotment. We have been visited by two local companies: A&E Vehicles and Richard Sutton Landscapers.

Pupils have excelled in practical lessons, learning how to perform a basic MOT and service,



including changing tyres, as well as using equipment such as petrol fuelled lawnmowers, strimmers, leaf blowers, and painting the allotment shed.

They have worked fantastically well as a team and been exemplary in the quality of their work.

Year 6 Residential

Year 6 residential was a really successful 3 days. Pupils started their trip with a visit to Howletts Zoo where they listened to a 'Gorilla Talk', saw lions, rhinos, elephants and tigers. Pupils enjoyed a play in the park after their lunch and then went to Kingswood to begin their stay. All activities were enjoyed by both pupils and staff, particularly a very muddy blindfolded


Youth club was celebrating the Kings coronation with Royal themed activities and Royal themed snacks.

Two year 9 classes enjoyed a morning of boating at Dunorlan Park in Royal Tunbridge Wells where they were able to relax and enjoy being outside in an area which was favoured by Queen Victoria and Edward VII.



Computing Update

In Term 5 pupils have been completing Units of work from the Information Technology and Computer Science streams of the Computing Curriculum. Pupils have completed extensive learning and the following is an outline of what some of the classes have completed.

Pupils in Hedgehogs, Penguins, Eagles and Year 7 completed units that developed their creativity with computers.

Hedgehogs used iPads and the Ardman app to make stop frame animations using Lego sets they had built, capturing movement through photographs and compiling them into animations. Penguins and Eagles both used computer software to draw and create their own animations, after learning how to use some animation software and planning using storyboards.

The pupils in Year 7 planned and created their own audio podcast from a script they had created. They were firstly taught how to use a program called Audacity (a digital audio editor and recorder), how to record their voices, add pre-recorded songs and audio effects. After learning what podcasts were they were tasked with making their own. These proved hugely entertaining to all who listened to them! Frogs, Falcons and Year 9 have all been learning how to think like a Computer Scientist. They have all learnt about algorithms (a list of instructions to complete a task or computation). For Frogs this was programming BeeBots with instructions to navigate a course.


For Falcons they completed a number of unplugged activities to understand how and why we use algorithms. These unplugged activities included such things as writing algorithms for making jam sandwiches and checking to see if these worked by making an actual jam sandwich using their instructions. They then went on to using a program called Logo, with the pupils taking control of a "turtle" to draw lines to make shapes and artistic patterns. Pupils in Year 9 have been learning about the four cornerstones of Computer Science and programming – abstraction, decomposition, algo-

rithms and pattern recognition. They have learnt about five key algorithms used by programmers for sorting and searching Programming data lists. This theory-based unit is in preparation for teaching the Year 9s how use the programming language Python.



Primary School

This term KS2 have been introduced to some of our summer sports like Cricket and Athletics. During our athletics lessons we have been practicing for our Sports Day on the 28th of June. PE

Secondary School

In the Secondary School this term we have had KS3 focusing on Cricket, Athletics and Rounders on a Tuesday afternoon. It has been a great opportunity to get our pupils out on the field and enjoying the sun. In their single lessons KS3 have been focusing on competitive games like Touch Rugby and Netball. The improvement from Week 1 to now has been remarkable.

This term 9D have been Swimming and they have been focusing on their different types of strokes to ensure they can swim the furthest distance they can. They will all be receiving a certificate for their fantastic participation and distances.

On Monday afternoons this term KS4 have had the opportunity to choose what they would like to do. Their options have been Cyclopark, Golf, Dynamite Gym or Table Tennis. There have been great levels of participation in all activities and giving our pupils the choice has ensured enjoyment which helps our Year 11's through their term of exams.



Just a reminder to everyone our Sports Day is coming up on the 28th June and will be coming around quick. There will be letters to go to each pupil in the school explaining the process. Primary sports day will be in the morning and Secondary sports day will be in the afternoon. We have been using our water trays for various purposes. We have really been enjoying the Lego and trying to make complicated modes of transport.



One of things we really wanted was a 'Mud Kitchen.' Our new mud kitchen has been placed near our camp fire role play area. We have been making all sorts of foods for our Frogs teachers. We especially like the 'muddy choccy cupcakes.'







This term in Science we have been focussing on 'Growing Plants.' We created our own flower pots using recycled milk cartons. We decorated them with felt tip pens and put holes in them for the water to drain. We planted different coloured flowers and have been watering them each day.

Recipe to Try at Home Tuna Pasta Bake

Ingredients:

200g Pasta 1 tablespoon Olive Oil 1 Onion 50g Mushrooms 1 Tin Chopped Tomatoes 1 Tin Tuna 1 Mozzarella Ball



Equipment Needed:

Saucepan, Colander, Frying Pan, Fork, Wooden Spoon, Small Knife, Chopping Board, Oven Proof Dish

Method:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°, Gas Mark 4
- 2. Cook the pasta in boiling water for 12 minutes and drain in a colander
- 3. Wash the mushrooms and slice
- 4. Peel and chop the onion
- 5. Heat the oil in a frying pan over a medium heat and gook gently for 5-10 minutes until soft
- 6. Add the mushrooms and cook for a further 5 minutes until golden
- 7. Add the tomatoes and juice
- 8. Mix together the pasta, tomatoes and Tuna
- 9. Tip into an ovenproof dish
- 10. Scatter over the mozzarella and bake in the oven for 20 minutes until heated through
