I pray that I will make it out alive and I make it home safe.

# **DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY**



It has been installed with a fantastic bench, hand carved from tree roots, as well as our bespoke hand-made sensory wall, which has been well used from all pupils across the school.


This area will continue to be added to over the course of the holidays so ....








One of our students Adam Year 10 was entered into the Young Cooks competition. This was open to all children and young people across Kent. There were thousands of applicants and he was selected as one of the 60 finalists and then one of 7 finalists in his category which is an amazing achievement. He got to experience cooking in the catering kitchens of Broadstairs College and presented his dishes to the judges, one of whom was Jane Beedle, a former Great British Bake Off finalist. Jane singled him out, to compliment his pastry making skills! He should be extremely proud of himself. We are!

Children of all abilities are encouraged to use their creativity and imagination to write a story they would love to read without the pressure of having to worry about spelling, punctuation and grammar.

It's for 5-11 year olds to enter - so Year 7s may still qualify, depending on their date of birth.

The story does not have to be 500 words; this is just the limit. There is a small list of the 'rules' and the judges' criteria available on the website. Pupils who wish to enter the competition will have to type up their story in order to submit it online in the autumn.

There are two categories: 5 to 7 year olds and 8 to 11 year olds. The submission window is between Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> September until Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November, so pupils have all summer to think about and even draft their idea!

aguarium. It was a fantastic visit.








After an elevenses croissant, the group headed to a snail farm to learn about how snails are raised – pupils and adults learnt lots of new things.

# Spanish Fiesta Paella Recipe to Try at Home

#### Ingredients:

- 1 Onion
- 1 Red Pepper
- 1 Chicken Breast or Thigh
- ½ teaspoon Turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon Smoked Paprika
- 150g Paella Rice
- 1 Stock Cube (Vegetable or Chicken)
- 300ml Hot Water
- 100g Frozen Peas
- 50g Chorizo Sausage
- 1 tablespoon Vegetable Oil



#### Equipment Needed:

Chopping Board, Small Sharp Knife, Scissors, Frying Pan, Wooden Spoon, Measuring Jug, Plate & 2 Small Basins

#### Method:

- 1. Prepare vegetables—peel and dice onion, slice pepper
- 2. Cut chicken into small pieces
- 3. Heat oil in frying pan and soften the onions and pepper
- 4. Peel the chorizo and dice into small cubes—add to the pan with the onions and pepper and fry until it releases its oil
- 5. Add the chicken pieces and stir until the meat is sealed
- 6. Stir in the rice until it is coated in the chorizo oil
- 7. Add the boiling water to the stock cube in a measuring jug along with the turmeric and smoked paprika.
- 8. Bring to the boil and simmer for about 15 mins, stirring occasionally
- 9. Add peas and cook for about 5 mins until heated through
